Arriving in Singapore

From Air

Airline passengers will land at Singapore Changi Airport Terminal 1-4. Approximate travel times to the city: By train: 30-35 mins By taxi: 20-25 mins

From Sea

By bus: 40-50 mins

Cruise passengers either disembark at the **Singapore Cruise Centre** (Closest MRT station: Harbourfront) or **Marina Bay Cruise Centre** (Closest MRT station: Marina South Pier).

Getting around

Mass Rapid Transit (MRT) Trains

Operating from 5.30am to midnight, single-trip cash fares range from \$1.50 to \$2.60. **Ez-link** fares start at \$0.83 (for buses as well).

Buses

Cash fares start from \$1.50. You can pay by **ez-link** (a contactless payment card for public transport), Mastercard or Visa contactless bank cards.

Taxis

Fares start from \$3.90 and all taxis are marked and metered. Hail them by the road, or when you're in the city, at marked taxi stands. You can also book them through these operators: Comfort & Citycab (+65 6552 1111); Premier Cabs (+65 6363 6888); SMRT Taxis (+65 6555 8888)

GST refunds

- If you spend more than \$100 in a single receipt, you can claim a refund on the 7% GST.
- Participating shops will display 1 or more of the following signs



- Present your passport to the retailer, who will log an Electronic Tourist Refund Scheme (eTRS) transaction with your passport details.
- Simply scan your passport at the eTRS self-help kiosks at the folloiwng locations: Departure Check-in Hall or the transit area at Singapore Changi Airport; or Immigration Checkpoints

Enjoy Changi Airport at your leisure

You are encouraged to check in at least 2 hours before your departure time, to enjoy the airport's many attractions – such as Jewel Changi – before going through immigration. Leave your bags at the **Baggage Storage** counters to browse stress-free, or opt for Early Check-In at any of the terminals, including Jewel Changi.

Taste local cuisine

If you didn't get enough of our hawker centres, make a beeline for **Singapore** Food Street (Terminal 3). Tuck into local delights like bak kut teh (peppery pork soup) and the local favourite Hainanese chicken rice.

Knick-knacks & such

Pick up an assortment of food souvenirs from the many Discover Singapore outlets across all terminals. or GIFT by Changi Airport (#04-233) at Jewel Changi. Brands such as Fossa Chocolate, Song Fa Bak Kut Teh, and Irvin's Salted Egg can be found in these stores. For non-perishables, these all-in-one outlets also offer everything from adorable Merlion plushies to Tiger Balm health products as well.

This airport is a destination in itself – come early to enjoy its offerings before you fly off.




EAT & DRINK

Taste seasonal beers at Tiger Street Lab, along with beerfriendly foods fresh off the wok by Bib-Gourmand recipient, Keng Eng Kee Seafood. Then there's Birds of Paradise Gelato (A), with its botanically-inspired flavours. A favourite with locals, Rich and Good Cake Shop offers Swiss rolls in 10 flavours including coconut and kaya (a traditional jam made from coconut and eggs). At L'éclair Patisserie, local pastry chefs create artistic pastries like Ispahan (a combo of rose, raspberry and lychee cream).



EXPERIENCE

Be awed by the hypnotic HSBC Rain Vortex, the world's largest indoor waterfall at 40 metres high, or feel like a trapeze artist while walking on the Canopy Bridge. Bouncy times await the young and young-at-heart at the Manulife Sky Nets ①, while the kids will go ga-ga over the first Pokemon Centre ② outside Japan.

It's a veritable wonderland of shops for the most thoughtful gifts to buy home. Jewel Changi Airport (78 Airport Boulevard) is a \$1.3 billion gamechanging edifice. With over 300 retail and dining outlets, it's home to local fashion brands such as In Good Company, The Shirt Bar and Yacht 21. For outstanding local eats, there's foodie favourites like White Restaurant. Violet Oon Singapore and LeNu Chef Wai's Noodle Bar. Its fifth level houses Canopy Park, which features the world's tallest indoor waterfall, all surrounded by terraced gardens, garden mazes and suspended walking nets. More on Jewel on page 5.



Design Orchard

Living up to its mantra as a place 'where local brands flourish', Design Orchard (250 Orchard Road) carries a selection of merchandise from more than 60 local brands. Pick up Peranakan-inspired cushion covers from **Onlewo**, or a chic chiffon dress from **Ginlee**. Thoughtful gift ideas are aplenty too, from cleancut dresses at **Reckless Ericka** to cool shades at **Rocket Eyewear**.

OUE Downtown Gallery

From self-service beauty kiosks to sustainable fashion accessories from **Essential Extra**, shopping at OUE Downtown Gallery (6 Shenton Way) is a hipster's dream. Try out trendy fitness classes from studios like **Absolute Cycle** and aerial yoga classes from **Upside Motion**, and reward yourself thereafter with delectable delights from Michelin Bib Gourmand-rated **Chen's Mapo Tofu**. Don't forget to check out **O+ Eyewear** for some stylish shades to up your street cred.

Suntec City

Suntec City (3 Temasek Boulevard) remains a firm favourite with Singaporeans for the sheer variety of items, and over 350 shops. Discover local retailers like Watch Wonderland – a multi-label store featuring curated timepieces from Singaporean watchmakers like BOLDR. Stop by Lee Hwa JewelSpace to try on pieces and take pictures for your latest #00TD (Outfit Of The Day), after dropping your kids off at SuperPark, a 40,000 sq ft indoor theme park to challenge their physical limits.





Funan

The new, tech-savvy Funan (107 North Bridge Road) is home to many new-to-market brands, such as the world's first **Dyson** store. Some 60% are homegrown labels, including fashion brand Love. Bonito with its on-demand stylists, and artisan jeweller Carrie K, where you can view a 3D-printed version of your pearl necklace before it gets made. Taobao fans will be thrilled by Taobao Store by Virmall for household items, furniture and fashion. Fitness enthusiasts can climb the 5-storey-high rock-wall at Climb Central, or watch an exciting play at the Wild Rice! Theatre.

- Reckless Ericka @ (Design Orchard) designs highly durable clothes incorporating Singaporean motifs. All collections are made at ethically run factories.
- Cheongsams (traditional Chinese one-piece dress)

 Road) embraces the spirit
 of the Art Deco movement
 in their designs.
- The jewellery pieces of Eden + Elie (a) (Design Orchard) are largely handmade using simple tools. Its designs evoke a modern Peranakan sensibility, with a commitment to responsible sourcing of materials and providing opportunities for underprivileged individuals.

Menswear

- The team at Gnome & Bow
 (#01-78 Millenia Walk)
 are behind the 'world's
 first storytelling bags and
 wallets', imbuing narratives
 from classic tales (like
 Dr Jekyll & Mr Hyde) into its
 card holders, wallets and
 leather goods.
- Frustrated at the way consumers and workers were being exploited, local brand **The Shirt Bar 3** (#02-463 Suntec City) struck out on its own, offering classic formals and quirky casuals all made with fair-wage partners. Pick up its Spill Resist shirts and say goodbye to wine or pen stains.

Bags & Shoes


- Lingwu's ♂ (43 Jalan Merah Saga, #02-78) leather goods combine traditional Asian craftsmanship with materials sourced from around the world. Its timeless totes and clutches are lightweight yet rich to the touch.
- It started out as a bespoke shoe outfit, but Ed Et Al ② (120 Telok Ayer Street) has since expanded its repertoire to include made-to-order and ready-to-wear shoes. Made at factories in Ho Chi Minh City, they are then hand-dyed by Singaporean artisans.
- Local shoe designer Orsq's militaristic and avant-garde creations have been featured at Shanghai Fashion Week.

They're retailed at **The Authority** (#03-03 Orchard Gateway).

Homeware

- 'Putting the fun in functional', **Naiise 9** (#03-24 to 29 Wisma Atria) products wittily re-interpret Singaporean icons. One of Singapore's best-loved dishes, chilli crab, gets its own plate, complete with a step-by-step recipe.
- Bring home a cushion cover or three from Onlewo (Design Orchard). Its refreshing takes on heritage, places and culture in Singapore and Asia can be seen in its eye-catching home and lifestyle goods.





Beauty

- Inspired by Peranakan beauty traditions. Pera Skincare (peraskincare.com) uses ingredients common in the culture - such as bedak sejuk, a powder made from rice and pandan leaf that has cooling properties - in its formulations.
- Kind to the earth and easy on the wallet, vegan-based Solos Cosmetics (2 (#01-03 Marina One Residences) is a crowd favourite with its lip glosses and liners - all in packaging that uses as little plastic as possible.
- Bring home Singapore Memories (Design Orchard) perfumes and room scents inspired by all things Singapore. We love Sunrise in

Botanical Gardens, described as the smell of 'orchids, green shrubs, cut grass and various other plants early in the morning'.

Timepieces

 Designed for 'urban explorers', watches by the Millennial founders of **BOLDR** 14 (Design Orchard) have a rugged vet refined aesthetic and are meant to be 'worn, used and abused every day'. Swiss-made movements feature in all models.

Food Souvenirs

• Irvins (5) salted egg snacks (potato chips/fish skins) are 'dangerously addictive' and available at most supermarkets.

- Shermay's 16 cilicuka (a chilli-vinegar sauce) is based on an heirloom recipe passed down from her grandmother. Buy them from Taste Singapore at Changi Airport.
- Vacuum sealed and packed for your luggage, Bee Cheng Hiang bak kwa (barbecued meat slices) is made with 100% natural ingredients without artificial flavourings or preservatives.
- · Consistent quality has made Bengawan Solo (B) the bakery of choice for many local families. Its kueh lapis (a multi-layered cake) and pandan chiffon cakes are well-loved and can be found in almost every neighbourhood here.

Next to food, shopping is a national obsession, and these are the popular hotspots.




As Singapore's largest outlet mall, IMM @ (2 Jurong East Street 2) is home to more than 90 outlets that offer discounts of up to 80% all year round. Whether you're into fitness, furnishings or fashion, this spacious mall has just about every major brand under its roof: Nike, Victoria's Secret, Coach, The North Face and Kate Spade, just to name a few.

Jurong East

VivoCity (a) (1 Harbourfront Walk) isn't just Singapore's largest retail and lifestyle destination, it's also the ultimate family-friendly mall. Besides numerous play areas, there's also kiddyfavourite Toys 'R' Us, and the largest Timezone arcade in Singapore. And since it shouldn't just be about the kids, there's Saint Laurent and Ted Baker for fashion ideas, and Best Denki and Muji for your home needs.

We daresay **Mustafa Centre**② (145 Syed Alwi Road) is just as popular with the locals as it is with tourists. Just about everything under the sun can be bought at very competitive prices. Besides exotic pickles, spices and sweets from around the world, shoppers can also get their hands on gold jewellery, handbags and a wide range of health supplements.

Farrer Park

What makes Orchard Road a perennial favourite? Let's see: There's 88-year-old grand dame **Tangs ()** (310 Orchard Road), which supports home-grown fashion labels like Elohim and Ginlee Studio. **ION Orchard** (2 Orchard Turn) has eight storeys of retail and F&B, including timelessly chic label **In Good Company** (#B1-06), while **Manifesto** (#02-17) at **Mandarin Gallery** (333A Orchard Road) impresses with its minimalist aesthetic.

BEST OF THE BEST

We highlight local restaurants and bars that have rightfully earned their international accolades.



DINING

- For the first time ever, two Singapore restaurants were awarded the Michelin Guide's coveted three-star rating. Stalwart Les Amis (#01-16 Shaw Centre), with a dazzling 3,000-bottle wine cellar, serves up elegant French cuisine, while three-year-old Odette (#01-04 National Gallery Singapore) offers a contemporary and inventive twist on the same fare.
- New entrants to this year's Michelin list include Cheek
 Bistro (2) (21 Boon Tat Street)

- for contemporary Australian food, and **Basque Kitchen by Aitor ©** (97 Amoy Street), where Basque dishes are elevated with Chef Aitor Jeronimo's deft touches.
- With cuisine described as 'innovative', Corner House
 (1 Cluny Road) retains its star and, helmed by local chef Jason Tan, celebrates sustainably sourced seasonal produce through its gastro-botanica cuisine.
- At **The Song of India** (33 Scotts Road), modern Indian

- fare is served in the luxurious setting of a bungalow. Ingredients not commonly associated with Indian cuisine, such as foie gras, are imbued with unmistakably Indian flavours to stellar results.
- Candlenut (3) (17A Dempsey Road) is the world's first Michelin-starred Peranakan restaurant. Owner-chef Malcolm Lee embraces his roots to deliver authentic Straits Chinese dishes with a modern twist.



- Atlas Bar (Parkview Square) made Time.com's 'Greatest Places 2018' list and has been lauded for its extensive gin menu (1,000 varieties) and a classic Art Deco-styled interior.
- As its name suggests,
 Native (3) (52A Amoy Street)
 cocktails are crafted with
 Asian ingredients and
 spirits. We recommend The
 Sarapan, which features
 a coconut distillate,
 butter roasted coffee, and
 homemade kvass alcohol (a
- Slavic fermented beverage made from rye bread).
- The stellar offerings at Jigger & Pony (1) (Amara Hotel) are thanks to bar manager Jerrold Khoo, champion bartender at the prestigious Diageo World Class Competition 2018 in Singapore. Order the Java Cooler: a mix of Tanqueray gin, sesame, calamansi and Fever Tree aromatic tonic.
- The Old Man Singapore (55 Keong Saik Road, #01-04) also clinched a spot on the

- 2019 World's 50 Best Bars list. A tribute to Ernest Hemingway, drinks here are named after his books, while 'Papa' memorabilia are strewn throughout.
- With inspired cocktails that celebrate the different eras of New York in a setting reminiscent of a grand hotel bar, it's no wonder **Manhattan** (Regent Singapore) was second on Asia's Best Bars 2019 list.

HALAL-FRIENDLY DINING

Halal food choices range from the traditional to the refreshingly innovative.



StraitsKitchen

Hearty and curious appetites should head for the halal-certified buffet spread at StraitsKitchen (Grand Hyatt Singapore). Here, local ethnic dishes like murtabak (flatbread stuffed with meat and spices), beef rendang (braised meat cooked in coconut milk and spices), Singapore laksa (spicy coconut milk-based noodle soup) and chilli crab are freshly prepared in its 'live theatre kitchens'.

Smith Marine

Enjoy halal seafood zichar (traditional dishes influenced by home-cooked Chinese food) at this kelong (wooden offshore platform) restaurant. No passport needed – just a 10-minute boat ride from Changi Point Ferry Terminal. Catch your own fish, or try the cereal prawns and clam beehoon (vermicelli).







The Halia

Set amid the lush surroundings of our iconic Botanic Gardens, The Halia (Malay for ginger) serves up modern European fare with Asian influences. Standout dishes include the Lightly Smoked Kingfish starter and Slow-cooked Chicken Breast.

Positano Risto

Healthy appetites can expect generous portions at Positano Risto (66 Bussorah Street). Italian dishes like osso buco (braised veal shanks) come highly recommended, while the arancini balls (rice balls stuffed with mozzarella) are described by one blogger as 'super addictive'.

Tongue Tip Lanzhou Beef Noodles

Lamian (hand-pulled noodles) are rarely associated with halal cuisine, but lamian lovers swear by the offerings at Tongue Tip Lanzhou Beef Noodles (#02-107 Tiong Bahru Plaza). Pick your favourite noodle types — from thick to triangular — to accompany its signature beef broth. Feeling adventurous? Take your chances with the mouthnumbing Mala Spicy Beef Noodle.

Hararu Izakaya

Muslim-owned Hararu Izakaya (16 Bussorah Street) offers a menu that goes beyond bar bites. Enjoy the highly recommended Edamame Aglio Olio, gyozas (pan-fried dumplings), and the tori nanban (fried egg-battered chicken in a sweet and sour sauce) on cosy tatami-style seating.

Blu Kouzina

This Greek restaurant (10 Dempsey Road, #01-21) in the hip Tanglin enclave comes highly recommended for its authentic appetisers — especially the Greek salad and halal lamb chops.

Reservations are advised as seats fill up fast. Note: This establishment has no pork, no lard and has halal-certified meats, but serves alcohol.

The Malayan Council

For fusion cuisine that works, head for The Malayan Council (10 Winstedt Road). Outstanding dishes include the Smoked Duck Lemak Chili Padi (a pasta dish served in a coconut sauce with bird's-eye chilli). Be sure to end with the Classic Ondeh-Ondeh Cake, inspired by the bite-sized treat filled with melted palm sugar and coated with grated coconut.

SUSTAINABLE DINING

Whether it's farm-to-table or nose-to-tail cuisine, here's where to go for guilt-free nosh.







Salted & Hung

This eatery (12 Purvis Street) does its bit for sustainability by ensuring that every part of an animal or fish in its dishes is used. This includes smoking, curing, pickling and grilling innards, skin and bones to emerge with dishes that adhere to Drew Chef Nocente's policy of "minimal waste". Some standout dishes include quail (chilli and quail reduction) and grouper with soy, charcoal and fermented prawn butter.

Kausmo

Produce usually discarded by chefs for being discoloured or oddly shaped is put to good use at this sustainable dining concept by the Les Amis Group. Kausmo (Shaw Centre, #03-07), derived from the word "cosmos", is its founder-chefs' way of addressing unnecessary food wastage, and to show that something good can come out of imperfection. The six-course modern European menu uses the day's seasonal ingredients.

Unanimously described as cosy, the tasteful little spot has also received rave reviews for its creative dishes, such as Avocado Kimchi Rolls, and Zucchini Linguine and Walnut Meatballs.

Tucked away on Funan's top floor and accessible by walking through the rooftop garden, Noka gets most of its produce from the nearby garden for its omakase (chef's special) or set lunches.

Poison Ivy Bistro

For a taste of rural Singapore, there's Poison Ivy Bistro (100 Neo Tiew Road), an offshoot of Bollywood Veggies, one of the earliest organic farms in the country. The bistro emphasises healthy eating, so expect less salt, no pork, no lard, and herbs and spices from its own farm. Try the Moringa Tempura, a plant with antioxidant properties coated with chickpea flour and deep-fried. Other unique offerings include Bolly Banana Curry and Jackfruit Lemak (a creamy sauce made with coconut).

Labyrinth

The mod-Sin (modern Singapore) cuisine at one-Michelin-star Labyrinth (#02-23 Esplanade Mall) features innovative dishes like nasi lemak (rice cooked in coconut milk, served with an array of side dishes) cheong fun (rice noodle roll) and Heartland Waffle. But beyond his clever dishes, Chef Han Liguang is committed to using locally sourced produce where possible. As one review has described it, Labyrinth is where 'traditional Singaporean food is completely re-imagined'.

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE

Over 600 different species of fantastic creatures can be found across these three parks. Whether it's the majestic white tigers from the award-winning **Singapore**

Zoo, or River Safari's adorable giant pandas, there will be many insta moments while you tour the elegantly landscaped habitats. Stay on for the world's only Night Safari, and hop on

a 35-minute tram ride touring everything from the rugged Himalayan foothills to the swamp banks of Equatorial Africa.



FOR FLORA AND FAUNA FANS

If birdwatching is your thing, Sungei Buloh Wetland
Reserve ① serves as a stopover for hundreds of species of migratory birds like herons and falcons. The Singapore Botanic Gardens is a lush oasis of over 10,000 species of flora, with some as old as its 160-year history. Or take a three-

hour trek to **MacRitchie Reservoir**'s **Treetop Walk** for stunning vistas 25m off the forest floor. The 250m-long suspension bridge closes at 4.45pm, so be sure to start early.







NOSTALGIC SINGAPORE

Beyond its modern skyline and shiny shopping malls, there are still pockets of Singapore that hark back to an earlier era. Pulau Ubin (an island off mainland) Singapore, gives you a glimpse of life in the 1960s. with old kampung (Malay for village) houses. Seletar Aerospace Park is a prime example of Singapore's colonial past. These days, its charming black and white residential bungalows house hip eateries popular with visiting locals on the weekend.



FOR CULTURAL CACHET

The ArtScience Museum (6 Bayfront Avenue) has hosted several cutting-edge shows, while modern Southeast Asian art can be admired at National Gallery Singapore (1) (1) St Andrew's Road). If street or mural art is more up your alley, head to the three cultural precincts of Chinatown, Little India and Kampong Glam. See page 24 for Cultural Precincts.

APPRECIATING ARCHITECTURE

With reputable international and local architects behind some of our most iconic buildings, Singapore has become a destination for gazers and students alike. Admire these edifices that celebrate form, style and function on architecture day tours organised by private operators like Jane's SG Tours. Marina Bay Sands, Gardens by the Bay (3). Esplanade, National Gallery - they're sure to take your breath away. Sign up, too, for tours that take you into the cultural precincts of Joo Chiat, Katong and Chinatown, where beautifully restored conservation shophouses live on as an homage to Singapore's heritage.

Sentosa island is popular with sun and fun seekers. Action fans can go for AJ Hackett's acclaimed bungy jump, or take to the skies through the wind tunnel at iFly Singapore (3). Kidfriendly pursuits include SEA Aquarium, home to some 100,000 marine creatures. On mainland Singapore, places like KF1 Karting (1 Turf Club Avenue), Bounce Singapore (8 Grange Road, #09-01) and Splash-N-Surf (1B Stadium Walk) offer more thrilling options.

CHINATOWN

Once home to early Chinese immigrants, this multicultural enclave has evolved into a bustling melting pot of old and new.



SEE & DO

- Dedicated as a time capsule to show stories of Singapore's early Chinese immigrants, the Chinatown Heritage Centre (48 Pagoda Street) is a must-visit for an introduction to Singapore's largest historical district.
- Look out for the life-sized murals of Yip Yew Chong (a), a local illustrator. His art depicts life in the district from an earlier era.
- Don't miss three of Singapore's oldest religious buildings: the Nagore Dargah Indian Muslim Heritage Centre (140 Telok Ayer Street), Thian Hock Keng Temple (158 Telok Ayer Street) and Al Abrar Mosque (192 Telok Ayer Street).
- For a hands-on experience into a vanishing craft, sign up for a two-hour Buddha effigy-making workshop at Say Tian Hng (www. buddhashop.sq).



FUN FACT Thian Hock Keng Temple was built without a single nail.

EAT & DRINK

- A spectrum of dining experiences await in Chinatown, from hearty hawker food to fine Scandinavian fare at the two-Michelin-starred Zen (41 Bukit Pasoh Road).
 Bib Gourmand-worthy zichar (traditional dishes influenced by home-cooked Chinese food) can be savoured at Kok Sen Restaurant (30 Keong Saik Road).
- Chinatown Food Street at Smith Street boasts iconic dishes by some of Singapore's most wellknown stalls. Order these to try: oyster omelette, satay (grilled, skewered meat) or fried kway teow (flat rice flour noodles).
- A few bars that made it to Asia's 50 Best Bars 2019 list can be found right here in Chinatown: **Native** (52A Amoy Street) and **Operation Dagger** (5) (7 Ann Siang Hill).





SHOP

- Jewellers like On Cheong (251 South Bridge Road) and watch retailer Kee Hin Hung (#02-21/22 People's Park Complex) have become mainstays in Chinatown, with their loyal band of customers.
- Health and wellness shops include Chop Wah On (34 Upper Cross Street) for its world-famous medicated oils, and Eu Yan Sang (#B1-35, Chinatown Point) for packaged tonic soups and supplements.

• Ever-popular food souvenirs mean snaking queues at retailers like

Tai Chong Kok (34 Sago Street) and Lim Chee Guan (203 New Bridge Road). The latter's juicy bak kwa (barbequed meat slices) is a favourite among local foodies.

Pek Sin Choon (1)

(36 Mosque Street) supplies teas to local restaurants, including its famous Unknown Fragrance, a blend of oolong tea varietals. Local-coffee lovers pick up their favourite blends from Nanyang Old Coffee (3) (268 South Bridge Road).

 A specialty store for Chinese products, the historic Yue Hwa Chinese Products (70 Eu Tong Sen Street) has always been the go-to place for brocades, cheongsams and embroidered wedding

emblems, among others.





KAMPONG GLAM

Rich Malay heritage aside, this district is chock-full of hipster cafes, shops and delicious eats.





FUN FACT

The base of Sultan Mosque's onion-shaped domes are decorated with glass bottle ends donated by poorer Muslims who

wanted to contribute to its construction.

SEE & DO

- With its distinctive yellow exterior, the Malay Heritage Centre (85 Sultan Gate) was formerly the residence of the Sultan of Johor in pre-independent Singapore. It holds artefacts tracing Malay culture dating as far back as the 18th century.
- Just five years shy of its 200th anniversary, the Sultan Mosque
- or **Masjid Sultan** (3 Muscat Street) is one of Singapore's most impressive religious buildings, with a prayer hall that can hold up to 5,000 worshippers.
- For instagrammably eye-catching murals and street art, head to Haji Lane (a), Sultan Gate, Jalan Pisang, Baghdad Street and the Gelam outdoor art gallery in Muscat Street.

EAT & DRINK

- Bib Gourmand awardee Hajah
 Maimunah (1) (11 Jalan Pisang)
 still dishes out nasi padang
 (steamed rice served with
 various pre-cooked dishes) the
 way it's been prepared for the
 last 30 years. Be sure to order
 the ikan bakar (grilled fish) and
 tahu telor (tofu omelette served
 with peanuts and a spicy sauce).
- Singapore Zam Zam Restaurant (697-699 North Bridge Road) is perhaps the country's most well-known murtabak (flatbread stuffed with egg, meat and onions) stall, and reportedly its oldest at 111 years old. Foodies swear by its chicken murtabak.
- At Scaled by Ah Hua Kelong (55 Haji Lane), dishes feature sustainably harvested local seafood, such as its XL Clams, all delivered fresh from its own kelong (floating fish farm).



 For photogenic Bubble Waffles and other sweet treats, Asian Rad Afters (33 Bali Lane) is an offshoot from Osaka, Japan. Exclusive flavours to Singapore are Peranakan Road and Little SouO.

- For a scent that's truly unique,
 Sifr Aromatics (a2 Arab Street)
 can customise something just for you, whether it's citrusy, intense,
 or uplifting notes you're after.
- Love the boho vibes of Haji Lane?
 Those with a soft spot for vintage clothing and handmade one-of-a-kind accessories head for Time After Time (76 Haji Lane) and SSFW (75 Haji Lane) respectively.
- Delightful homewares and other lifestyle items can be found at Scene Shang ① (263 Beach Road) and Supermama (265 Beach Road).

LITTLE INDIA

Soak in the infectious vibes of this vibrant enclave. It's hard to resist the pull of its cultural attractions and incredible shopping.

SEE & DO

- Orientate yourself at the Indian Heritage Centre (5 Campbell Lane), with films and interactive galleries detailing the history of early Indian immigrants in Singapore. For art with an experimental vibe, UltraSuperNew Gallery (107 Rowell Road) has scheduled exhibitions, so do check its website before you plan a visit.
- You'll find a curated mix of retail offerings and palate pleasers at the new **Tekka Place** (2 Serangoon Road) Make a beeline for Xin Tekka, featuring legendary hawkers, next generation food vendors and famous home cooks all under one roof. Feast your eyes on the iconic mural or head for the rooftop for cultural activities.
- Do the temple trek Serangoon Road's Sri Veeramakaliamman, Srinivasa Perumal and Sri Vadapathira Kaliamman (a) or Chander Road's Shree Lakshminarayan.
- For a dose of heritage, ARTWALK
 Little India (artwalklittleindia.
 sg), organises events that bring
 to life the history, culture and
 art of Little India. Especially
 Instagrammable is Artwalk Trails,
 which takes you behind the story
 of the precinct's colourful murals
 and how they came to be.



EAT & DRINK

Plan a morning visit to Tekka
 Market (a) (665 Buffalo Road). After viewing an eye-popping array of fresh market produce, adjourn to the food centre to feast on cuisines from many cultures. The Indian food stalls are standouts: Be sure to try the ubiquitous hot ginger tea and nasi briyani (Indian spiced rice dish with meat or vegetables). Follow the long queues and you can't go wrong.
